

In the Core Classroom:
Cura Personalis 3 in the Humanities

Jesuit education is built on the principle of *cura personalis*—care for the whole person—and this value is woven into SLU's Undergraduate Core through a three-part sequence of courses and experiences. These courses/experiences invite students to pause, reflect, and consider how best to care for themselves and others—both during their time at SLU and as they prepare for life beyond graduation. The final course in the sequence, *Cura Personalis: Self in the World* (CP3), challenges students to answer the question: "How does SLU's Core uniquely prepare me for my next steps beyond the university?" While CP3 emphasizes career-readiness skills such as résumé building and mock interviews, it also provides space for deeper reflection on who students feel they have become and who they aspire to be.

Although most CP3 courses are taught as general sections open to students from any major, five departments within the College of Arts and Sciences—English; History; Linguistics, Literature, and Cultures; Philosophy; and Theological Studies—have collaborated to create a CP3 specifically for Humanities majors. Spearheaded by Dr. Torrie Hester, Associate Professor of History, *Your Humanities Degree at Work* will allow students majoring in the Humanities to explore career preparedness through dialogue with other Humanities majors. This version of CP3 retains core elements from general sections—students still craft résumés, attend the Career Fair, and take stock of their strengths and skills. However, this course helps students translate the theoretical and critical approaches central to the Humanities into practical skills for the workplace.

"This course will not only help prepare Humanities majors for job X, Y, or Z," noted Dr. Hester, "but will also prepare them to be flexible, thoughtful people in the world—individuals who care about details, ethics, and why things matter. This course aims to lift students up with purpose." The course launches in Spring 2026 and will be first taught by Dr. Kayla Dang, Assistant Professor of Theological Studies
